He Comes Not To Destroy But To Resurrect: Believe & Receive this Easter

There is an old story about a priest who went to a barber to get his hair cut. And as he was having his hair cut, he was talking to the barber, and he was trying to lead this barber to Christ. And he was telling him all about the Christian faith. The barber didn't seem particularly interested. He said, "Well that's fine, but I can't see why it's necessary." He said, "Basically I do my best, and as far as I can see, I think that's all that matters."

So when the barber finished with his haircut, the priest asked his barber to just sit down in the chair for a moment. And he seated him in the chair, and then the priest put the white cloth around that barber in the chair, and he took a hold of the scissors. And the barber said, "Now hold on a minute, what do you think you're doing?" And the priest said, "Well, I'm going to cut your hair." And the barber said, "But you don't know anything about cutting hair." And the priest said, "Well, I know I don't, but I'm going to do the best I can." And the barber said, "Well, your best is not good enough."

Our best, if it is uninformed, and ill-considered is not good enough. When it comes to the spiritual life our best can be downright harmful to ourselves and to others, if we don't take the time to learn the truth about spiritual things. And the truth is that the spiritual life requires a lifetime of learning and indeed re-learning, because we tend to forget the most obvious elements of the faith, and we constantly need the grace that comes from the

teaching of Scripture and the grace of the Sacraments.

In Luke 20:9-19, Jesus tells the parable about a vineyard and the owner. I like to retell the story as taking place on a farm:

A man worked on a farm for forty years. He built it up, installed irrigation pivots, kept the soil in good shape through crop rotation, proper fertilizers, and erosion prevention. He built some nice barns. And then he retired, rented out the land and moved away. At the end of the season, it came time to collect the rent. And so he sent his accountant to collect. But the tenants beat up his accountant and sent him away empty handed. And so the owner sent his attorney out to collect the rent, but the tenants also beat him up and insulted him, and they sent him away empty handed. So, the owner sent the sheriff, but this time the tenants shot at him and ran him off the property. So, the owner, who was extremely persistent, sent his son, who was an experienced mediator. The son went to the tenants to collect the rent, but they killed him.

Now with whom do you identify in the story? Jesus, in the version of the story from St. Luke, seems to suggest that we are the tenants. The clear point of the story is that God is the owner of our farms, our homes and our lives, indeed all that we are and all that we have. But we habitually forget about God. In the swift and varied changes of the world, our wills and affections become unruly. We do not obey God. All of us hate to admit it, but much of the time we just ignore God and forget that God owns everything upon which we depend.

That barber did not want the priest to ask him to come to church. He felt like he did "very well thank you" without worshipping God on Sunday and without being part of a Christian community. And all of us, whether we go to church or not, sometimes become complacent.

So what then will the owner of the farm do with these violent and self-centered people? What will become of us? The provisional answer, given in this story, is that he will come to destroy those tenants and give the farm to others. But no! God Almighty, who is represented by the owner of the farm, does not come to destroy, but to resurrect. God does not show up to retaliate, but to redeem. Jesus, the Son of the owner dies, yes, but then God raises him from the dead so that we might live.

This parable is an invitation to enter deeply into Holy Week and the whole Easter season. This Holy Week and Easter, come and learn. Come and be changed. And keep on learning so that year after year you become less violent and more gentle, less afraid and more courageous, less full of yourself and more full of the Holy Spirit. This Easter season live into the whole story of Jesus so that you increasingly become a whole person in Christ. Our best is never good enough, but God's best creates in us a life that is truly good.

What Is A Verger?

I am regularly asked, “What is a Verger”, so thought it was about time to put my fingers to work, rather than my right arm!

A Verger is a person within the Church who assists the clergy in the conduct of public worship. It is said that the Verger serves the church in a ministry of welcome and the duties of the Verger vary from parish to parish. Vergers can be full-time or part-time, paid or volunteer. Their duties can be purely ceremonial or include other responsibilities such as parish administration, leadership of the worship committee, sexton, etc. He or she may serve in other capacities throughout the church; such as Sacristan, Acolyte Master, Sexton, Chalice Bearer, Lay Reader, Usher, Protector of the Procession, Doorkeeper, Grave Digger (so far I have not been asked by Fr. Steve to dig any holes in the Memorial Garden!), Master of Ceremonies or anything else that the parish requires.

The Office of Verger dates back to the Middle Ages when the Verger was the ‘Protector of the Procession’. He led the Procession into the Church or Cathedral, clearing the way for the Procession and protecting it from vagabonds and animals that tried to attack it. Today, in many parishes and cathedrals you will see a Verger ceremonially leading the Procession. The Verger wears a gown and carries a Virge (staff of Office) to help clear the way, and point the way for the procession (hence the use of my right arm).

WHERE DID VERGERS ORIGINATE?

The office of Verger has its roots in the earliest days of the Church’s history. It shares certain similarities with the former minor orders of porter and acolyte. Generally speaking, in the olden days, Vergers were responsible for the order and upkeep of the house of worship, including preparations for the liturgy, the conduct of the laity, and grave-digging. Although there is no definitive historical survey of the office of Verger, evidence from Rochester, Lincoln, Exeter, and Salisbury Cathedrals, England, indicates the existence of Vergers as far back as the 16th century. A familiar sight today in parishes large and small, throughout the UK, Vergers have maintained the buildings and furnishings of the Church for many centuries.

WHAT IS A VIRGE?

The Virge is the staff that a Verger carries in procession. The name comes from the Latin “virga” which simply means a rod or staff; hence, a ‘Verger’ is one who carries a staff. The Virge can trace its history back to the ceremonial maces carried before civic and ecclesiastical dignitaries. The Maces of State used in the House of Lords and the House of Commons of the British Parliament are examples of another modern use of the medieval symbols. Originally a weapon used to clear the way for processions (and control unruly choristers!), its use is now principally honorific. The size, style, and shape of a Virge varies from place to place; but one end typically has a cross or other Christian symbol mounted on it. (The one I use at Holy Trinity was personally made by our previous Verger, Lt. Col. George Carlson, and has the Holy Trinity symbol at its head).

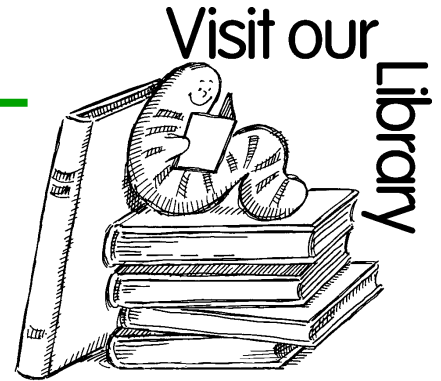
What was she involved in? Mary was a follower of her Son and she is relevant in His story. She was there

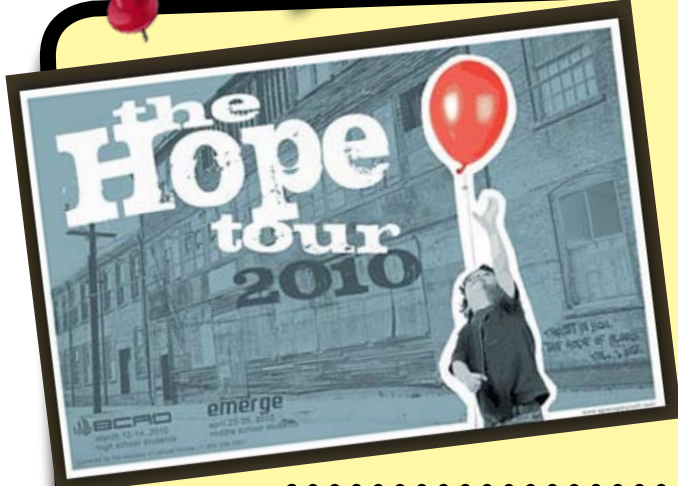

Cabin Renovation at Camp Wingmann

Holy Trinity “adopted” the last of the old cabins (really just a shell of a building). The church gave \$55,000 as part of the church tithe to “outreach” on the Capital Campaign. That money and much “sweat equity” has gone into remodeling the cabin (which was originally constructed in the 1930’s). Unfortunately the money was not quite enough to complete the project. The camp is \$5000 to \$7000 short of what is needed to finish the job. In particular, materials for bunk beds, plumbing and floor coverings are needed. To meet this need, a generous donor has agreed to match contributions up to \$3500 to finish this project. Checks can be made out to Holy Trinity with a notation “CW cabin.” Watch for news about a fundraiser for Camp Wingmann coming in May!

HTEA Choir Appearance

On **Sunday, April 25th** the Holy Trinity Episcopal Academy Choir will be singing at the 9:00am service.
