Summer Fun and Godly Play

Have you ever thought of fun as Godly? You should. God created us and when he looked at his creation he saw that it was very good. (Genesis chapter one) We are meant to enjoy God's creation and to experience re-creation in recreation.

Perhaps some of you will visit the Disney amusement parks this summer. Our favorite entertainment in Disney World is the last big presentation each night at Hollywood Studios (which used to be called MGM Studios). It is a show that is presented in an outdoor amphitheater that surrounds a small lake. The stage is an artificial island in the middle of the lake. The "imagineers" of Disney use lasers, fire, cartoon characters in costume, and clips of Disney movies projected on fountains of water to represent Mickey Mouse as a sorcerer battling Disney villains (from the many Disney movies and cartoons). Mickey is up against the bad witch from Snow White, the greedy Governor Ratcliffe from Pocahontas, as well as other representations of evil including (in one version of the show) a huge fire-breathing dragon. It is striking that while all the villains look grim, Mickey (of

course) never stops smiling. A narrator maintains that positive imagination can overcome the grim forces of evil that threaten to destroy human love. In the show, of course, love triumphs over all. The Beauty (Belle) embraces the Beast who becomes her prince. Pocahontas embraces John Smith. The clear message is that love in the face of hatred heals the hostility between people and helps us to see the world as full of fun, adventure and beauty.

The First Letter of John is all about love triumphing over evil. It tells us that, "everyone who loves is born of God and knows God... for God is love." (I John 4:7-8) This kind of triumphal love involves playfulness and smiling. Probably the best learning from our sabbatical in 2005 when we studied family ministry in growing churches is that family-friendly churches are quite simply fun places to be. People smile. There are intergenerational activities that involve kids and adults of all ages. Most importantly people understand that God wants us to have fun in life!

We are very glad that Holy Trinity Episcopal Church is so full of fun. In this church we take the hurt of the world very seriously, and because of that, we find great ways to play.

International Day last month was a blast – and it raised over a thousand dollars for the hungry. At the special Guild meetings in May there was lots of laughter – and good food – as the women supported each other in fellowship. The Sunday School recognition Sunday rocked with bounce houses and a chocolate fountain – even as we connected with new families to expand our children's program in the new building in September. Coming up on the first weekend in June, we'll have a special training session and adult forum about "Godly Play", our creative and fun Sunday school program for children. Our choirs always smile! Lots of kids from the parish are going off to Camp Wingmann, "a fun place for kids to know and grow in Christ." And the list goes on... be sure to check out the rest of the newsletter for even more ways to have fun at Holy Trinity.

So this summer we encourage you to cultivate lives of fun lived to the glory of God. Play so that you can better pray. Have fun so that you can better serve. And bring this joy to your church so that together we can believe with the psalmist (16:11) that "in [God's] presence there is fullness of joy; in [God's] right hand are pleasures forevermore."

Coming soon with a spot for you: Covenant Groups

Are you looking for a safe way to explore your faith with individuals who share your interests and life experiences? Are you seeking to develop new friendships or strengthen some you already have? Ever want to learn more about, or process the sermon you heard? A covenant group might be just right for you!


What is a Covenant Group?

Covenant groups are led by parishioners in fellowship with each other. In weekly small group meetings, parishioners and guests build Christ-centered friendships, share their concerns and joys, deepen their understanding of the Gospel and their relationship to God, and offer support and prayers for each other. There can

be covenant groups centered around ages, gender, or even interests. Perhaps a group of men could gather weekly at a coffee shop before work. Maybe a group of grandmothers might connect weekly in each other's homes, a hiking group meeting at local trails, a gentleman's group meeting before or after a round of golf, etc.

What happens in a covenant group?

Groups will all develop their own style, along a similar outline. The group will open and close with prayer. Lasting between 1 ½ to 2 hours, a large portion of the time is spent with members sharing a high point and low point of their week. Then a discussion centered on a subject that rises out of

"real life" follows, using a reflection guide based on the previous Sunday's sermon and/or gospel. Most Covenant groups will have between 5-10 people present. How can I learn more or join a Covenant Group?

This fall we will be offering an adult forum to further discuss Covenant Groups. We are actively seeking parishioners who might be interested in leading

Right now, we have one newly formed covenant group. This group meets Monday mornings from 9:30-11:30 in the Parish Hall, is for moms of young children, and offers childcare in the nursery as we meet. Interest has been expressed in a second group for working moms to meet one evening a week. It is likely that this group will take form by late summer/early fall. 
Guest Preacher on June 7th

From the Counselor's Desk

The great Flo Ziegfield revolutionized entertainment in the early part of the last century. He was intimately involved in all aspects of his productions from the auditions through to the final performances. Openings for dancers to be in his Ziegfield Follies were extremely competitive and highly prized. Auditions were lengthy and the dancers dressed in a variety of ways that could catch Mr. Ziegfield's eye. The story is told of a talented young woman who appeared each day during the week-long audition in the same modest outfit, newly washed and pressed. He approached the woman and asked her why she wore the same practice clothes each day, when the others changed frequently into eye-catching outfits. She looked him in the eye and, without shame, told him that the outfit was the only one she had and that she believed that her ability, not her clothing, was what was important. He hired her immediately.

Here was a young, unknown dancer facing a famous and powerful Hollywood mogul. She was self-assured as a person and confident in her talent. Her assertion was that the trappings counted little but that what was on the inside was the important thing. Instead of being

embarrassed with how little she had materially, she made the best of what she did have. She had to work hard each day to present herself in the way she wished. (Remember that this was before the days of washers, dryers and no iron fabrics)

For many people, current days are hard both economically and personally. Thoughts go to the boom times in the recent past—of vacations taken, of privileges enjoyed, of greater

financial freedom. There is disappointment and longing for life in better times. Some people endure a reduction of income through either cutbacks or job loss. Some lose their home. It may become necessary to work harder for less return.

This might be a time when it would be easy to begin to doubt one's personal abilities or to generally lose confidence in one's self.

There might be bitterness that life is giving a "raw deal" or anger that what is happening is undeserved. Nothing good can come of these attitudes either in relationship with those who are close to you or in your relationship with God.

How can you affect a perspective or attitudinal shift? An effective approach would be to assess the resources available to you. You are probably already aware of the external

resources: your finances, your real assets, your support system. The internal ones are not assessed as easily. God is number one—your most faithful resource. He is always there. He is in you, through you, around you and is your greatest fan. He has provided you with all your gifts. Look at your strength and courage. Do they serve you well? Are you honest in identifying your

deficits? What about your perseverance? Is that one of your gifts?

It is only through identifying your gifts and resources that you can most effectively use them. Think of the young dancer. She used what was available to her without apology. In fact, it is likely that she was noticed because of her lack of multiple clothing changes. She invested her time into those things that would best help her move forward with her career, with her life. Her sense of self was not dependent on what she didn't have. She focused on what she did have and used it to her advantage. She was mindful of the present and how she could best utilize her resources.

We, too, must be mindful of this moment. When times become difficult, the more successful individuals sometimes find it surprising how creative or resilient they really are. They maintain a grateful heart for what they have and try to learn the lessons that come from changes in life circumstance. Their attitude is never one of resentment, bitterness or regret but of hope, gratitude and faith. Just as the young dancer did, we "put our best foot forward" and bring the best we are to whatever life brings. As Christians, that is our way.
