## Wisdom: An Upside-Down Perspective on Life

Very quickly, without thinking too much about it, picture in your mind someone who is smart. Now, just as quickly, picture someone who is wise.

For many of you, those two images may be somewhat different. Usually, the word 'smart' is associated with the traditional symbols of power and success – nice clothes (business suit), good job, nice car, money, attractive, and energetic. The word 'wisdom' generally brings up a picture that includes a wrinkled face and longish grey hair, someone with a sense of peace and contentment.

Which one would you rather be? Rich, successful and well-groomed or old, wrinkled and having a perpetually bad-hair day? Being smart is highly valued in our culture. Being smart is how you get ahead in life. It's harder to see what wisdom can do for us, so many of us relegate it to that list of things we'll get around to doing when we retire.

Several years ago a high school senior made national news when she scored a perfect 800 on both sections of SAT and a perfect 8000 on the tough University of California acceptance index. No one else had ever accomplished this. At her high school she became known as "Wonder Woman" because she was so smart. But what was interesting was a little exchange between this young woman and a reporter. The reporter asked her, "What is the meaning of life?" She replied, "I have no idea."

We can acquire more and more knowledge – we can be straight 'A' students – and still have no idea about the meaning of life. Even when we seem to have the world figured out, there is something inside of us that asks (in a whisper) "Isn't

there something more? Isn't there a deeper meaning to why I exist?"

Jesus answers, "Yes!" But there's a catch. We have to be willing to change our perspective 180 degrees, to look at the world upside-down.

My favorite illustration of this idea is from a children's book called *Reflections* (by Ann Jonas). Most of each page is taken up by a picture, with just one line of the story at the bottom of the page. It starts out with a child waking up in bed at sunrise to watch the activity on the bay. There is a fishing boat, a ferry, sailboats, a few storm clouds, and a deserted boat yard. Then she takes a walk through a grove of birch trees. Deep in the woods, she turns around. (At this point you have to turn the book upside down to continue reading.) The same pictures suddenly look very different. The birch trees become a frog pond. The boat yard becomes a campground. The storm clouds turn into a person feeding ducks. The sailboats are kites. The ferry is a restaurant. And the sunrise becomes the sunset. Ever since I first saw this book years ago, I've been amazed by it. I can sit for a long time, turning it around and around, wowed at how different the same picture looks.

This is the kind of re-orientation that Jesus is calling us to. This is what the Bible is talking about when you see the word 'wisdom'. Wisdom changes people, not by turning our hair gray and giving us wrinkles, but by changing what we see when we look at the world and therefore changing how we respond. The clenched fist of competition becomes an open hand ready to serve. Storm clouds of anger become peaceful conversation. The person who is sinking into the depths of despair is lifted up into new life. Gossip becomes prayer. Pity becomes compassion.

Jesus invites us to allow Wisdom to take up residence in our hearts, minds and souls. Jesus invites us to allow Wisdom to turn us on our heads, so that we see the world from a new perspective.


The Letter of James (chapter 3) tells us what a Wisdom-filled life is like. James writes, "Do you want to be counted wise, to build a reputation for wisdom? Here's what you do: Live well, live wisely, live humbly. It's the way you live, not the way you talk. Real wisdom, God's wisdom, begins with a holy life and is characterized by getting along with others. It is gentle and reasonable, overflowing with mercy and blessings, not hot one day and cold the next, not two-faced. You can develop a healthy robust community that lives right with God and enjoy its results only if you do the hard work of getting along with each other, treating each other with dignity and honor." (from *The Message*)

This week I encourage you to take a few minutes every day to look at some aspect of your life with a new perspective. It might be something to do with your job, your neighborhood, your family, or your friends. Picture it in your mind; then turn it around and upside down. Take that picture to Jesus in prayer. Ask yourself how Jesus would look at that situation. What does Jesus want you to see? Just like with the children's book, a new perspective is often right in front of us. We just have to allow the Wisdom of God to shift our perspective in order to see it. This week give the Spirit of Wisdom an opportunity to work in your lives in a new way – to turn your perspective around – to help us see one another the way God sees us -- upside down.

## Library Matters

*Recovering the Lost Tools of Learning: An approach to Distinctively Christian Education* by Douglas Wilson. (1991) This is an important book for parents, teachers and others involved in contemporary education, and it is as revelant now as it was in the nineteen nineties. He addresses the problems of Christian and secular schools and suggests reforms for both. About the failings of our public schools, he writes, "failure can be traced to certain root assumptions about man and knowledge." These assumptions can be traced to the tenets of humanism. He further explores the nature of knowledge and learning and how these are the basis for educating students in the knowledge of Christ and obedience to God.

He then focuses on Christian Education and proposes a curriculum based on classical thought. "A Christian school requires diligent thought and hard work in prayer", he writes. He bases much of his thoughts about Christian education on his experiences in founding the Logos school and includes samples of its curriculum. He strongly favors the inclusion of compulsory Latin, because study of this dead language bestows many benefits for students. He cites several studies which demonstrate that students who studied Latin did much better

in all their classes, not just English and the romance languages. Highly recommended.

*When God Doesn't Make Sense* by James Dobson. (1993) Dr. Dobson writes about people in despair, exhorting them to turn to God and His Word, when we are facing difficulties. He assures us "that the heart of the Lord is drawn to those who hold fast to their faith in times of despair." Furthermore, he writes, "it is an incorrect view of Scripture to say we will always comprehend what God is doing and how our suffering and disappointment fit into His plan." His frequent use of scripture and personal stories illustrate the point that God always has us in mind, no matter how we may feel that He doesn't make sense.

*Horizons of Mission* by Titus Presler. One of The New Church's Teaching Series, this book by Titus Presler, covers the role of missions in the past and in the world today. Presler, who served as a priest in Zimbabwe, explores the scriptural basis of the growth of Christianity in the Global South. He addresses the dilemmas of those sent by God in the name of Jesus, especially in the face of contemporary ideas of



multiculturalism. He writes, "the gospel is inevitably expressed through a culture. This is a weakness that God undertook in the incarnation, because the word did not become flesh in a transcultural human being, but in one named Jesus, a Jew of Palestine. This incarnational dynamic is, in fact, Chritianity's saving word to all human cultures...the gospel of Jesus transcends culture, but no single expression of the gospel can be free of culture."

*A Manual for Eucharistic Visitors* by Beth Wickenburg

Ely. (2005) This guide offers suggestions on how to prepare oneself spiritually to present the sacrament, what to do when visiting the sick or shut-in parishioner and how to prepare a sacred place in someone's home or in a hospital. This book also includes prayers, guidelines, service for sending forth Eucharistic visitors. She also traces the history of lay administration of communion.

Zondervan, a leading publisher of Christian books, has put out a volume of excerpts from some of its best-selling books. Included are authors Rick Warren, Philip Yancey and Lee Strobel, among others.

## Children's Chapel and Sunday School: What's the Difference?

It was brought to my attention that some members and visitors think that Children's Chapel is the educational offering for children at Holy Trinity. Chapel is actually one very small piece to Children's Christian Formation. During chapel children ages three and older gather together in Pearson Hall for a short Bible story, God Box discussion, prayer, sometimes a short activity, and to state our beliefs using a Children's Creed with similar meaning to the Nicene Creed. This brief time is great for our children but certainly does not replace the longer, hands on approach to faith that they experience in Sunday School. Sunday School takes place following the 9am service also in Pearson Hall. Classes are broken down by age or grade in school. For our preschoolers we offer a Hands on Bible class, for K-2nd grade we offer Godly Play, and for 3rd-5th grades we offer Godly Play as well. 
## Men's Retreat: Pick Up A Brochure Today!




## Distinguished Lecture Series
